

The Lakehead Region Conservation Authority is a community-based environmental agency responsible for the wise management of renewable natural resources within the Lakehead Watershed. The LRCA was formed in 1963 by an expansion of the Neebing Valley Conservation Authority, which was constituted in 1954. We provide quality of life and value-added services to residents through our programs including watershed management, erosion control and mitigation, flood forecasting and warning, recreation, water level monitoring, plan input and review, environmental education and stewardship. As a leader in environmentally-sustainable practices and responsible stewardship, we look forward to strong collaborations to achieve the priorities in our inaugural Strategic Plan.


